PLANNING TO GRADUATE?

Chestnut Hill College School of Graduate Studies confers degrees three times per year. Students completing their requirements in the summer and fall semesters may receive their diplomas in August and December respectively. Students completing requirements in the spring semester will receive their diplomas in May. Students completing requirements at any time during the year prior to the May graduation date will be invited to attend Commencement exercises in May. Requirements include submission of a *Request for Graduation* form, which is available in the Graduate Office and at CHC.edu; these forms must be completed and returned to the Associate Registrar, School of Graduate Studies by the deadlines listed below. Matriculating
